Dear Friends of the Red Cross:

Reflecting on the past year, what stands out is the spirit of giving that is alive in our community. In this annual report you will find a snapshot of your generosity at work.

When you volunteer, make a financial contribution or donate blood through the Greenwich Chapter, you save lives around the world. You help people cope with disaster, whether it's a home fire, a medical emergency, natural disaster or terrorist attack. You offer support for families of military members and provide international aid to vulnerable countries.

In 2002-2003, our disaster action teams came to the aid of more than 39 families locally, providing immediate assistance to get them on the road to recovery with clothing, grocery, and shelter. With the country's new terror alert system, the Greenwich Chapter responded to its community and assuaged concerns by offering piece of mind with "Together We Prepare" - a national campaign that encourages and instructs how to prepare for a disaster. Greenwich volunteers were deployed to national disaster locations including Louisiana, Mississippi, and Guam.

We remain committed to providing programs that save lives. We reached more than 6,500 children and adults with Red Cross health and safety education. Everyone who participates in our programs becomes part of a larger community that helps. In addition, the Greenwich Chapter expanded our Motor Services Department - a service providing free transportation to and from medical appointments - to include special services for dialysis patients. Our Youth Services Department continues to provide young people with meaningful community service opportunities. The Red Cross helps kids develop leadership skills and self esteem while learning how good it feels to give back to their community. Our nationally recognized Safe Rides program, which provides youth with a "safe ride" home with no questions asked, brought 2,209 community youth to their destinations.

There are a myriad of ways you and your loved ones may be touched by the American Red Cross, if it has not happened already. Without the assistance of our volunteers we could not do what we do. In 2002-2003, 1,361 volunteers aided 16 employees, plus 12 per diem instructors, to touch the lives of our residents.

The Greenwich Chapter is proud of what we have achieved and the number of families we have assisted - with your help. Your support let's us know that you share our mission. Through our compassionate and generous Red Cross friends and the strong partnership with the United Way, we are able to keep our promise to help when help can't wait.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

DISASTER SERVICES

Disaster response, preparedness, and planning are the top priorities of the American Red Cross. All assistance provided to victims of disaster is free of charge. Red Cross disaster relief focuses on meeting people's immediate emergency disaster-caused needs. When a disaster threatens or strikes, the Red Cross provides shelter, food, and mental health services to address basic human needs. The Red Cross also feeds emergency workers, handles inquiries from concerned family members outside the disaster area, provides blood and blood products to disaster victims, and helps those affected by disaster to access other available resources.

Last year, the American Red Cross Greenwich Chapter helped more than 2,075 people prevent and prepare for disaster with 28 presentations on disaster and emergency service, 20,603 pieces of educational material was distributed, and 71 Disaster Supply kits were sold. 131 people took courses in Disaster Services. Our Disaster staff and volunteers responded to 26 disasters locally and joined our national Disaster Services teams at response sites nationally. We aided 39 individuals locally suffering loss after a disaster. New disaster preparedness curriculum, "Masters of Disaster" and "Facing the Fear," were introduced to our local schools and 646 students. Our Armed Forces Emergency Services served 110 members of the military and their families and provided 16 Quality of Life packages to our troops overseas. Our Language Bank assisted 17 individuals. Additionally, 26 presentations were presented to 1,216 people about International Humanitarian Law.

HEALTH AND SAFETY SERVICES

For nearly a century, the Greenwich Chapter of the American Red Cross has been saving lives through health and safety education and training. Each year we conduct classes that stress accident prevention, injury control, and emergency response. From first aid, CPR and bloodborne pathogens training to swimming and lifeguarding, HIV/AIDS education and Babysitter's Training, American Red Cross programs help people lead safer and healthier lives. The Red Cross constantly strives to respond to the health and safety concerns of Americans at home, in school and in the workplace. Today's innovative programs also include teaching lay persons and professionals how to use automated external defibrillators (AEDs) to save victims of sudden cardiac arrest.

In 2002, the Greenwich Chapter's Health and Safety Services impacted more than 6,500 lives with lifesaving training and skills. Approximately 1,646 people were instructed in First Aid, CPR and AED. An additional 2,397 enrolled in Aquatics & Water Safety training and 237 lifeguards were trained. The Greenwich Chapter has been an active collaborator in Lyme Disease prevention education. Last year, in partnership with Time for Lyme Inc. and the Greenwich Department of Health, we created a Tick Removal Kit and 500 were sold or distributed in the community, including our schools. Our free Medical Loan Closet served 199 individuals in need of equipment. We continue to partner with the Department of Health in providing HIV/AIDS education programs at Greenwich Hospital. The Red Cross was visible at health fairs promoting the importance of health education and provided First Aid Stations at 41 community events treating 63 individuals.

BLOOD SERVICES

The most visible division of the American Red Cross is Blood Services. Touching more lives than ever before, we continue to provide the nation with the safest possible blood products. The use of technology and science, however, is only made possible by one simple selfless act: An average person takes time out of his busy schedule to give a piece of himself so that someone he will never know has a chance to live. This incredible act of kindness is at the heart of what we do.

In the fiscal 2002-2003 year, the Greenwich Chapter held 42 blood drives with the aid of 22 community sponsors. We collected 2,352 pints of blood.

VOLUNTEER SERVICES

Every day, the American Red Cross helps people in emergencies . . . whether it's half a million disaster victims or one sick child who needs blood. Our vital work is made possible by people like you, who learn how good it can feel to lend a helping hand. Red Cross "everyday heroes" come from all walks of life. They're all ages. Everyone has something special to offer . . . including you. We depend on our 1,361 volunteers, who constitute 97 percent of our total work force, to carry on our humanitarian work.

YOUTH SERVICES

Today, the involvement of young people with the Red Cross is more important than ever. Our goal is to provide young people with meaningful opportunities for education, training, and volunteer/community service so that they remain a part of the Red Cross family throughout their lives. Young people make up 30 percent of Greenwich Red Cross volunteers. In Red Cross programs young people are being educated about leading healthier, safer lives as well as being trained to serve as peer educators. Our Safe Rides program gives high school students the opportunity to volunteer and to give leadership. In addition to organizing this confidential service participants get their peers home safely via rides in Red Cross vehicles. Our programs educate youth about other cultures and provide an opportunity to learn about international humanitarian law and its implications worldwide. We support school related activities and contribute to our young volunteers' leadership development with clubs and councils.

During fiscal year 2002-2003, Youth Services engaged more than 350 young volunteers. Our Youth Council, comprised of 28 members, led their fellow peers. Our school clubs offered 64 sessions and fostered 40 kids. More than 225 youth leadership development trainings were given. The Greenwich Chapter gave 12 presentations to 321 kids regarding peer education, mentoring and self esteem. Safe Rides, a confidential transporting service for youth administered and organized by teens, delivered 1,660 rides to 2,209 area youth in need of safe passage home. The Measles Initiative, done in collaboration with our National Headquarters, made a difference in the lives of those threatened by the disease in Africa with local fundraising efforts. We continued our global education with the School Chest program that resulted in 36 chests full of school supplies, many compiled as local classroom projects, that were delivered to 1,440 school children in war torn Afghanistan.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

RESPONDING

The massive destruction left behind by Super typhoon Pongsona's assault on Guam December 8 did not stop the relief efforts of the American Red Cross. Three members of the Greenwich Chapter's National Readiness and Response Corp (NRRC) were part of the recovery efforts. Striking with the intensity of a Category 5 hurricane, the typhoon ravaged the U.S. territories and pushed its way onto the Red Cross Top 5 list as the second-largest disaster relief operation of 2002. Arriving on the island, the NRRC couldn't believe the devastation. They celebrated their New Year by cleaning up debris, rebuilding homes, distributing food and water - helping to create new lives.

ALWAYS THERE

Just because a disaster doesn't make the national news doesn't mean it didn't happen. Residents of a Wampus Lane apartment complex were evacuated when a fire raged through their building in the middle of the afternoon. Residents returned home from work to find their belongings in ruins and family pets lost. Your Greenwich Red Cross Disaster Action Team provided comfort, care and support to these victims - immediately identifying and coordinating a care center across the street from the complex. Here victims had their immediate needs assessed, received coupons for grocery and home goods, grief counseling, hotel reservations and started on the long road to recovery. These families were helped by people like you who give of their time for people in need.

PREPARING

Disasters and emergencies are often unexpected. But we can go a long way in lessening the personal devastation of a disaster by preparing beforehand. With the national kickoff of the "Together We Prepare" campaign, Greenwich joined other American Red Cross chapters, Blood Services regions and Armed Forces Emergency Services stations urging families, businesses and neighborhoods to make a plan, build a kit, get trained, volunteer and give blood. The Greenwich Chapter assessed its community's needs and comprised a saleable Disaster Supply kit complete with every item needed to shelter-in-place for three days.

The annual Carnival for Kids was held March 1 and 2 at Greenwich High School. An exciting combination of fun and education, this family-oriented event attracted more than 3,000 attendees.



The American Red Cross is responsible for supplying more than half of the nation's blood supply.



The National Readiness and Response Corp, provides vital emergency assistance to communities affected by disaster. Approximately 200 NRRC members will serve at Red Cross Chapters throughout the country.

AROUND THE WORLD

The mission of the Red Cross is to help prevent and prepare for disaster around the world. Each year, a disease barely remembered by most Americans kills nearly one million children, a half million in Africa alone. For less than a dollar, a child can be easily and safely vaccinated against measles. That dollar covers the cost of all necessary resources, including the vaccine, syringes, cotton balls, safe disposal of syringes, training for volunteers and the resources to spread the word about measles in local communities. The Youth Council of the Greenwich Chapter joined the fight against measles with local fundraising efforts, including a 5k walk, "March for Measles," raising \$4,600.

PREVENTING

Matt Slaine always wanted to give back to his community. As an intern for the Greenwich Chapter, he moved the idea for a tick removal kit from the drawing board to a reality. With Greenwich quickly moving to the top of the list in Lyme disease cases, the need for increased education and prevention was imperative. To date, the unique Tick Removal Kit has been distributed to every Greenwich public school and more than 1,030 have been purchased by the public. Slaine also created a mascot to introduce Lyme disease education to young children - Nick the Tick. This project was completed in collaboration with the Lyme Disease Task Force and the Greenwich Health Department.

SAVING LIVES

Virginia 'Ginny' Long has been teaching others how to save lives for more than a decade as a Health and Safety instructor. When a co-worker suffered cardiac arrest, Long quickly sprang to action delivering the life saving breaths in the crucial minutes before emergency medical workers arrived. Her friend survived and Long was awarded the National Certificate of Merit in October. This is the highest honor that one can receive from the Red Cross for sustaining a life. The certificate is sent to the White House for the President's signature.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION
